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# Mr. Hall Sends Farewell Letter to Seniors

May I take this opportunity to say thank you to all the members of the senior class who have contributed so much to Southfield Senior High School. Many of you have left lasting memories and have done much for which members of the faculty and I have been so proud.

We have come to that time of the year when you are ready to leave the high school to begin life in the practical world. It is my sincere hope that we have provided you with a map to help make your way through life. This map, I hope, should be like a road map that tells of all the turns and twists along the route, those which are good to follow and those which should be avoided. Teachers, as map makers, have gathered the experience of those who have been over the road many times before, and this map offers guidance based on knowledge, not on guess. To throw aside this map and attempt to disregard its warning and helpful hints often brings regret and tragedy.

I am sure many of you leave here keyed up with messages of inspiration. You probably have been told that anything you want you can get, if you want it badly enough. This may or may not be true. I do think however, that you should decide first, whether what you want is worth the necessary effort. If the attainment of this goal would require sacrifices that would destroy happiness and the health or require a whole life of endless struggle, the goal would hardly be worth such sacrifice. One should consider not only the attainment of the goal as the chief end but also the means of

attainment. If the good must be attained by dishonest, selfish or thoughtless means which will hurt others and bring unhappiness to many, it is not worth striving for. It is better to change one's ambition than to pay a price far out of proportion to that which is finally gained.

Most of you do not realize how many of your thoughts and opinions are inherited from the past and how little original thinking is actually done. For this reason I hope you can see the importance of eliminating from your store of knowledge old prejudices, hatreds, jealousies and misconceptions. Your store of knowledge is burdened with antiquated ideas, misconceptions, ancient prejudices and ha-

treds. Start now to do some housecleaning so that the future generations will not be handicapped.

You have an obligation to your parents, to the school, fellow men and your country. This is an obligation to make life better, to choose from your vast accumulation of knowledge, of customs and traditions, those things which are good and helpful and true and worth preserving. Those things which are evil, harmful and dishonest should be discarded so they will not be handed down to the next generation.

As you leave Southfield, you may be thinking only of what you will make of yourself. Everyone is thinking of what you will make of the world. Do not disappoint them.

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# Baseballers Bat .500 In Conference Play Davis Places Eighth In State Competition

Jay baseballers have attained a five win and five loss record in Inter-Lakes conference play.

Senior Mike Fournier was the losing pitcher for the Jays as they fell to the hands of the Walled Lake Vikings, Friday, May 25, by the shutout score of 2-0.

Jay's sparse hitting attack was led by senior shortstop Jack Hancock who went two for three.

Southfield nine dropped a league game to the Waterford Skippers, 3-2,

May 22, and left slim hope for a conference championship this season.

Dave Wolgast and John Francis' consistent hitting helped produce the Jays' runs. Wolgast went three for four and Francis two for four.

Jays had nine hits to Waterford's six, but bad breaks prevented them from taking advantage of their hitting performance. Reader was the winning pitcher and Mike Fournier suffered the loss.

Southfield cindermen put forth an excellent effort in both the State-finals and State regional meets. The Jays gained much deserved recognition from all participating schools.

Ed Davis finished eighth in the mile-run in the state final track meet held at the University of Michigan, May 26.

His clocking of 4:32.4 set a new school record. Davis was competing against the 30 top milers in the state.

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## Golfers Finish Second In Inter-Lakes Play

Jay linksmen ended their 1962 season on May 21 by defeating Berkley and Waterford, finishing second in Interlakes play for the season. Walled Lake won the championship.

Southfield finished with 209 opposed to Berkley's 223 and Waterford's 224. Rod Kaminski finished first with 40, Jim Ellis second with 41, Lloyd Hetzer and Rick Marshall tied for third with 42, and Don Nippa was lost with 44.

May 18 and 19 saw the Jays finish sixth in a field of 17 teams with a 358 total. The Farmington Falcons finished first with a 323 total.

## Netters Lose Cliffhanger

Fitzgerald netters defeated the Jay matchmen 3-2, May 22, in a closely contested meet.

Winners for the Jays in the doubles were Ed Haubert and Mike Weiss with scores of 6-3 and 6-4.

Southfield netters blanked Pontiac Northern in a conference match, 5-0, on May 18.

Winners in the singles matches for the Jays were Bill Winter with scores of 6-2 and 6-0, Gary Silverstein 8-6 6-2, and Ed Haubert 6-1 and 6-3.

Doubles teams composed of Les Wilkinson and Chuck Miller and Tom Jannetta and Rudy Reinhart had scores of 6-4, 6-4 and 2-6, 11-9 respectively.
